Most of the horses involved in this service are Morgan horses that have been rescued from neglect, abuse, trauma, and left to die. Morgan horses have a long history in the military and serving our country. They continue to serve by helping our veterans' heal from wounds on their own.

ST. PETER'S LUTHERAN SCHOOL NEWS

The last month before school begins for another year. So many mixed feelings fly around. We have excitement. Anticipation and sometimes a bit of trepidation can be seen and heard. These are all natural feelings and necessary as well. Think of what it would be like if everyone had a feeling of total indifference. How sad that would be. So let the excitement, anticipation, trepidation and whatever feelings that are flying around exist. It all means that another year of school is meaningful and that is good.

What has happened as we prepare for the new school year? All of the teachers will be in the same classrooms as last year and they will be teaching the same age levels as they did last year. This is a good sign of stability. The new gym floor is in and we are hoping that the new bleachers will be installed in August. All of the floors have been cleaned and are shiny with several coats of wax. The desks and chairs have been scrubbed. All of the inside windows have been washed on both the hallway and classroom sides. Many other tasks have been completed. Summertime has not been idle.

Teachers will officially begin on August 17 for our first meeting. On August 18 the staff will have special training in a program called ALICE. This program is designed to train the staff in what to do in the rare case of an invasion into our school. The Reedsburg Police Department will be doing the training and are part of the program. During August the teachers will be making their home visits and meeting their new students and other family members.

The use of technology seems to be taking over the world. It is a real challenge to keep up with all that is happening. We are constantly working on improving our technology education plan and keeping as current as possible with our training and equipment. This summer we are replacing all of the teachers' desktop computers. They are used to communicate with school families, maintain student grades and many other tasks. All of the teachers' machines are 8 – 10 years old. We are also adding 3 Chrome Books for the students to use

on a trial basis to begin working with as that is what is used in the high school. Funds from the Day Care Account are being used to make these purchases.

On Sunday, August 23, during the 8 a.m. service, all of the teachers will be rededicated to their special mission of teaching at St. Peter's Lutheran School. It is truly a special calling. On Thursday, August 27, the Parent Teacher League will be sponsoring a Back to School Night from 5:30 p.m. until 7 p.m. Students will have the opportunity to bring their supplies in, meet their teacher, reconnect with classmates and make some of those "Let's get ready for school" steps before the first morning of school.

Finally, thanks to all of you, the members of St. Peter's Congregation, who have maintained and supported a Lutheran School since the congregation began in 1867. May the Lord continue to bless you as you have been a blessing to so many.

Busyness is the new trend. It's stylish. We spend an inordinate amount of time comparing how busy we are with everyone else. We compare

our schedules, our kid's schedules, how productive we are and how much we have because of it to everyone around us. And if we don't do or have what the next guy does or has, we just get busier and produce more so that we can.

This consumes our conversations and thoughts. And this should give us pause: Who is consuming whom, here? Are we the consumer or are we those consumed? It's no accident that our adversary the devil is described as a lion prowling around seeking to devour us, to consume us. He gives us the liturgy of this world, the liturgy of productivity and consumption. For if he can keep us busy in "muchness" and "manyness," he can be satisfied.

And this is why the Lord, after finishing all His work of creation, rested on the seventh day. This is why He established the Sabbath day—to give His people rest from all their work. As they rested, He continued to work for them, to satisfy them, to fill them with His gifts—food from heaven by His Word and Promise.

That day came when from our Lord's cross and in His death, He proclaimed, "It is finished" (John 19:30). And so His work of redemption was complete. And so His body rested in the tomb, the belly of the earth. Though He is the Lord God who

always works, yet as the Lord rested on the original Sabbath, now Jesus kept the Sabbath by resting in the tomb and rising from the dead to live forever. For this is why He came. This is why He became man: to draw all to Himself so that He could give rest and refreshment to the weary and the heavy laden.

Sabbath is God's gift of time free from all of the anxiety and hurry of this world so that we can rest, be refreshed by the gifts God gives. Society won't do it for us. They are addicted to the liturgy of productivity and consumption. Though we are in the world, we are not of it. We are the people of God, His own children by water and Word, joined to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Jesus lives. And so shall we. So rest in the promise of our Savior that sin, death, and time have not hold on you because Jesus is raised from the dead. Jesus lives. And so shall we, forever.

Quarterly Voter's Meeting
Thursday July 23, 2015**

The meeting was brought to order by President Tim Brandt. Scripture reading and prayer by Dennis Andreasen. Request for everyone to sign the attendance sheet by Tim Brandt
Motion to approve the April Voters Meeting minutes and the June 21, 2015 Special Voters Meeting minutes made by Craig Hillman with the following correction to the June 21, 2015 mtg: "The balance of the funds needed to complete the gym floor project is not to exceed 20,000 to come from the School Property Improvement Fund in the Foundation." 2nd by Gil Biskupski. Motion carried.

Pastor's Report as written, presented by Tim Brandt. Motion to approve membership changes as written, presented by Gil Biskupski, second by Craig Hillman, motion approved.

Principal's Report presented as written by Dennis Andreasen.

Treasurers /Financial Management Report presented by Nathan Braun as written. Motion by Kent Westphal to approve the Treasurer's Report/Financial Management Report with corrections, 2nd by Matt Dehn. Motion carried. Correction regarding the Jan Schultz memorial monies should not have been in the Income and Expense Fund, but in the Foundation Report.

Foundation Report presented by Linda Biskupski as written. Linda noted that the Jan Schultz memorial should have also been placed under the "Gifts over \$200 to Foundation column.

Recommendations through Church Council

Board of Elders Motion by Phil Rogers to raise the pastoral assistance funding for budget year 2016 from \$6000 to \$12000 for approximately 40 hours per month. Second by Kent Westphal. Motion carried.

Motion by Aaron Oberman to pay up to \$10,000 from the Seminary Fund in the Foundation to Pastor Klingbeil for Doctorate education once Pastor is accepted into the program, 2nd by Matt Dehn, motion carried.

Projection system will be installed within the next two months with donated monies as reported by Aaron Oberman.

Board of Education: Motion by John Gerike to change the By-Law in Article VIII-Supervision as follows: (The proposed new wording is shown in bold and italics.)

The congregation supervises its Christian Day School through its Board of Christian Education. ***The Board of Christian Education's responsibility is to make policy for the Administration (Principal) to carry out. The Administrator (Principal) may be male or female.***

Second by Gil Biskupski. Request for ballot vote by Kent Westphal. Carl Baumgart made a motion to table the motion until Bible studies could be completed. Second by Sarah Oberman. Ballot vote: "yes" vote would table the motion. A "no" vote would allow further discussion and possible voting on the original motion. 41 voters signed the attendance sheet. 41 written ballot votes were turned in. 20 voted "yes" to table the motion. 21 voted "no".

John Gerike made a motion to postpone the original motion indefinitely, seconded by Sarah Oberman. Written ballot vote taken, "Yes" vote supports the motion to table indefinitely. 41 voters signed in. 32 written ballot votes for "Yes", 8 votes for "No", motion postponed indefinitely.

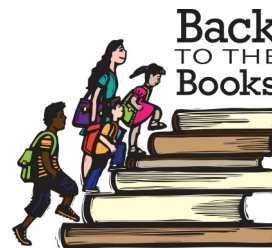
